

Outdoor Fitness Equipment

The MCA fitness trail has 32 stations to help you stay fit while enjoying the great outdoors. Each year the MCA has replaced several pieces of old equipment

in our distant memories. Communities in the south Florida area are still faced with cleanup and storm damage and The Meadows is no exception. While 95% of our storm debris has been removed, we are still working on replacing and up righting perimeter fences, wooden enclosures and FPL lighting. There are tarps on some structures, pool cages damaged and homeowners' waiting for contractors to perform services. It is hard to believe that we are on the heels of Hurricane Season once again.

June 1st - November 30th is the



official Hurricane Season. Current projections indicate that the 2023 season will be about average with 11-15 named storms. Four to eight of those named storms are expected to reach hurricane strength, with one to three of those hurricanes achieving major hurricane status. Prepare early this year. Properly preparing for the aftermath of a storm is critical. Remember we are a private community with private condominium and homeowners' associations. Refresh the Look of Your Yard with Mulch, Not Fertilizer

Sarasota County prohibits the use of fertilizer containing nitrogen or phosphorus from June 1st to September 30th. It makes sense too, because summer rains wash fertilizers and pollutants into waterways causing harmful algal blooms that kill aquatic life.

Please do your part and observe the fertilizer restrictions. Our storm water ponds flow into Philippi Creek and eventually into the Gulf of Mexico and these types of nutrients feed red tide making it worse.

Playground Refresh

The Meadows playground has recently been top dressed with play safe mulch. This refreshing look is aesthetically pleasing, allows for necessary drainage, and helps keep weeds away, and above all safer for play.

Keeping Up Traditions

While preparing this article, I looked back at earlier Meadoword columns written by previous chairpersons. The collection of issues stored on the community website goes back to Volume 26, January, 2008 (www. themeadowssarasota.org/themeadoword).

These articles provide a historical snapshot of community issues and concerns over the last 15 years. The first edition of our monthly newspaper appeared in 1983, so there is more to be discovered in the paper copies stored in MCA records.

It is important to know the history of a community and appreciate the contributions of residents who made The Meadows such a remarkable place to live. What impressed me most in this research was the commitment and dedication to community service displayed by previous board members, chairpersons, and volunteers.

Looking at the masthead of the January, 2008 issue, I see many familiar names. I know some early leaders and mentors of our community. Others I know of only from stories gleaned in conversation with neighbors whose roots in the community go back further than mine.

Many families have owned homes in our community for multiple generations. This fact alone



indicates that there is something special about this place.

As I work around my house and garden, I reflect about how I am enjoying the benefits of the original plan, remodeling decisions, and landscaping improvements made by previous owners. As I walk or drive around The Meadows, I am impressed by its architectural variety, natural beauty, and quality of maintenance.

The Meadows is a diverse community. There are approximately 3,500 residential properties plus 4 commercial properties (the country club, shopping village, Aviva Senior Living, and The Meadows Center for Nursing and Healing.) There are 52 property owner associations consisting of 2,888 residences, which include a mix of condominiums and approximately 252 single-family homes. In addition, there are 562 properties not affiliated with an association

grouped into approximately 9 additional neighborhoods.

Each community has its own identity, architecture, and governing organization with often differing rules. The Standards Committee plays an important role in mediating between the homeowner and the community to ensure that rules are applied consistently with careful attention to precedents and sensitivity to changing fashion.

Many Standards Committee volunteers have lived in the community for years and served on multiple committees. They have a deep knowledge of its history and serve as mentors to newer members.

We are also fortunate to have many staff who have a long tenure with the community.

Their experience in interpreting and applying the rules in a fair and consistent manner based on established covenants and precedents is critical to the success of Standards Committee activities.

The Standards Committee exists in partnership with the community to help assist homeowners with planned improvements and make sure these changes conform to community requirements. Working cooperatively with each other, we hope to continue the traditions that make The Meadows such an outstanding place to live.



During the month of March, 2023 there were (15) incident free days - (5) More than February 2023. There were (29) reported incidents - (6) more than February 2023. There were (140) citations issued this month - (48) more than February 2023.

Incidents are defined as a variety of complaints or concerns ranging from minor to more concerning activity reported by a resident. Examples of such (but not limited to) are; an alarm, animal/fishing complaint, reports of safety hazards, burglary, harassment, welfare check, dumping, solicitation or suspicious person(s).

Citations are violations that do not respect our documents reated to Meadows standards. Examples of such are: restricted vehicles, parking violations, garbage cans not being picked up or put out too early, violations subject to tow, sign restrictions.

Safety responded to the following during the month of March:

WELLNESS CHECK

■ March 8 — a woman with

dementia was reported missing from her home. A subsequent search found the woman to be in the court yard of her home, safe.

March 16 — it was reported to safety that a man who was confused, did not remember where he lived. A search of the database provided contact information and residence.

Safety was able to escort the man home and explained to his spouse what had happened, she took custody of the man.

ANIMAL COMPLAINTS

- March 10 about a large alligator which was directed to administration.
- March 13 a snake in the middle of the road at Longwater Chase which was released into the wild.
- March 30 a dog attacking another dog (party was unknown) in the Harperscroft community. There were no known injuries sustained to either animal and report was for the record.

FISHING COMPLAINTS

- Two complaints of nonresidents fishing. Safety advised that it was a private community and the subjects left The Meadows proptly.
- Three complaints related to residents fishing. Safety responded an identified that those fishing areas were in the appropriate designated locations.

SUSPICIOUS PERSON REPORTS

- a male and female occupant in a blue Buick taking pictures in the Windsor Park area. Subsequent search was unsuccessful.



he warm spring season is the perfect time for cool, refreshing salads, and making homemade dressing is easier than you might think. Dressings are whipped up in minutes, stay fresh in the refrigerator for several days and can double as dips or marinades.

All you need are four things: a base, a flavor-maker, some seasonings, and a sweetener.

For vinaigrette choose an oil as a base. Olive, coconut, or walnut oil are great options. For creamy dressings, create a thick base from full-fat canned coconut milk, soft silken tofu, mashed avocado, mayonnaise or softened cream cheese.

Flavor-Maker

To flavor a vinaigrette, some possibilities are red wine vinegar, balsamic vinegar, lemon juice, champagne, or raspberry puree. To flavor creamy dressings, try mustard, horseradish, ketchup or relish.

Seasonings

Add your favorite herbs and spices. Dill, oregano, onion powder,

garlic, thyme or chives are flavorful choices as well as sea salt and cracked pepper. For a little kick, add a pinch of cayenne pepper or paprika.

Sweetener

A touch of sweetener balances the tanginess. In lieu of sugar, I prefer maple syrup, honey and stevia.

You can use this four-step guide to create your own signature dressing.

The benefits of olive oil are many including heart and brain health. Red wine vinegar contains the important antioxidant resveratrol. Maple syrup is rich in vitamin B, potassium, calcium, and zinc.

The Burrata salad shown above was made during one of our Healthy Cooking series. The dressing was made with a balsamic reduction, a touch of garlic, lemon juice whisked with olive oil.

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




