Recognizing a Dedicated Contributor to Our Community



t is with my sincere sympathies and much sadness that I inform you of the passing of our colleague, friend and fellow Meadows Community Association (MCA) Board member and Meadows Country Club member, Tom Pound.

Tom and Sue have been avid social and tennis members of the country club and Tom enjoyed playing bridge in The Meadows for some time. Tom served as an MCA Board Director, President of the Meadows Homeowners Association (MHOA, now known as Meadows Single-Family Homeowners Alliance MSHA), was a member of

the Emergency Preparedness Committee and the Activities and Events Committee Liaison to the MCA Board. Our Pickleball players at the Club and in the community owe a debt of gratitude to Tom as he relentlessly advocated for more Pickleball courts in The Meadows, and that reality will come to fruition in 2024. Tom and Sue have made so many positive contributions together, to both the Community and The Country Club. Tom's dedication and commitment will be an everlasting memory to The Meadows, we thank him and Sue.

Contributions to the American Cancer Society may be made in honor of Thomas P. Pound of Sarasota, Florida.

Recently, Tom asked me to nominate a successor to the Meadows Community Association Board to fulfill the remainder of his term due to his declining health. It was with the deepest respect for Tom and his many, many contributions, ideas, leadership and quality time that we follow his recommendation and elect a similarly qualified resident.

Welcoming a New Board Member

It was my extreme pleasure to put forth the nomination of Ned Boston to our Board, who was unanimously approved as an MCA Board Director.

Ned grew up in Westerville, Ohio and attended Ohio State for both his undergraduate and graduate studies in Political Science. Upon graduation, his career spanned time in both County and State governments in Columbus for 17 years. At the point of his resignation, he was the Director of Claims Processing for the State of Ohio's Medicaid program. His Division was responsible for accurate and timely processing of several billion dollars of Medicaid claims.

In 1985, Ned was recruited to join Wisconsin Physicians Service Insurance Corporation, what is now WPS Health System as a Director and was soon promoted to Vice President and subsequently further promoted to Senior Vice President. He was responsible for Offices in Madison, Wisconsin, Detroit, Chicago and Marion, Illinois as well as Minneapolis, Minnesota. He was responsible for an administrative budget of over \$100 million per year. He retired early in 2006 to spend more time with his wife and to travel country wide in their motor home.

That travel continued until his wife's passing in 2018, and he moved to Sarasota in 2019. His wife and he had spent time over the years in Sarasota and liked the community as a place to live.

Ned and his wife were both very active with the Red Cross as Disaster Service volunteers and CPR instructors. He was the Vice Chair of the Board of Directors of Wisconsin Special Olympics for several years as well as a member of the Board of a private club in Madsion.

Ned resides in the Villas of Papillon community and served a term as Secretary of the Board of that Association and is currently the Chair of its Long-Range Planning Committee. In this role, Ned will lead the charge to revise and restate Papillon's documents. Ned also serves as the Chair of the MCA's Pickleball Committee, Co-Chair of the Assembly of Property Owners and Chair of the Assembly's Executive Committee.

Besides travel, his hobbies include amateur radio – for 64 years – as well as sports cars, motorcycling and last by certainly not least, Pickleball.

Please join me in welcoming Ned to our Board.

The MCA thanks everyone in the community who works hard to maintain their property values, support and participate in our lifestyle programs, and volunteer to keep The Meadows a thriving updated community.

ASSESSMENTS

Assessments are due March 1st, delinquent by March 10th, sent to Collections March 30th.

SAFETY

E-bikes, Electric Scooters & Other Power-Driven Motorized Devices (except for golf carts) are Prohibited on Walkways, Sidewalks and Nature Trail.

Golf carts using pathways must be equipped with warning devices to alert other pathway users.

Speed Limit is 25 Unless otherwise posted. Please keep the community safe and observe the posted speed limit.

STANDARDS, EXTERIOR IMPROVEMENTS, ARCHITECTURAL APPLICATIONS

All exterior improvements require an architectural application. (Unless you are making a landscape change in an existing bed).

No architectural application, No approval, No exterior improvement.

The MCA's goal is to assist you through the Architectural Application process and help you understand what is permitted. Proceeding with an exterior improvement without proper approval could result in fining or having to return the project back to its original condition.

Sandy Truman, Standards Community Administrator who is always willing to help, has over 10 years of experience working at the MCA, she can answer questions related to common area, architectural or standards questions.

The Meadows Oral History Project (https://www.meadows-oral-historyproject.org/), is a collection of information and stories about the early days of the community. It preserves the collective memory of the community- the shared experiences, values, as remembered by a variety of residents, that contributed to making The Meadows such a great place to live.

How much do you know about the early history of our community?

The Meadows was one of the first Developments of Regional Impact (DRI) in Sarasota County. This designation meant that water management districts, regional planning councils, state and federal pollution control agencies, and local governments were all part of the approval process.

The developers had to create plans for arterial roads, flood control, schools, hospitals, libraries, fire stations, wastewater treatment, and commercial facilities. It was a massive undertaking. It was the first DRI in the area and became the textbook for other developments that followed.

In 1973, Sir Frank Taylor of **Taylor Woodrow Construction** purchased the Newburn Ranch in unincorporated Sarasota County for development. He hired Smally, Wellford and Nalven (SWN) as civil engineers to plan and develop The Meadows.

On November 14, 1974, Sarasota

Early Days in The Meadows

County approved the development plan for The Meadows. We celebrate the 50th anniversary of the community this year.

Don Smally was one of SWN's partners. His son, Len Smally, remembers working on the survey crews for The Meadows when he was a student. Len studied civil engineering in college. After a stint in the US Navy, he returned to Sarasota where he worked as a Director of Public Works for the city of Longboat Key. Later, Len became manager of The Meadows from 1998 to 2015.

Len remembers The Meadows as pasture land with low swampy areas, lakes, stands of oaks, and slash pine trees.

The 17th Street entrance was a dirt road with a sales office near the lake. 17th Street ended at the canal just west of The Meadows entrance. There was no bridge. Taylor Woodrow built the bridge as a requirement for the project.

The Meadowood wastewater treatment plant on 17th Street was also part of the development. It was a first in Sarasota Countyan innovative, closed-cycle system designed to use wastewater to irrigate golf courses. It included a centralized irrigation system to store and re-use rainfall, which is our lake system.

The original plan for The Meadows

included two schools, a village shopping center, office complex, curvilinear roads (an innovative idea in America pioneered by Taylor Woodrow back in the 1930's) situated among trees, nature trails, golf courses, and other types of open space. The Meadows "cluster-housing" plan was designed to offer a mix of home-ownership choices from single-family housing to condominiums.

Bill and Doris Eiseman purchased the first property in The Meadows. They moved into their Woodmans Chart condo on January 21, 1977. Their son, Tim Eiseman, remembers his experiences living in The Meadows in the earliest days of the community as a young student and seasonal construction worker.

Bill and Kathy Maier moved to The Meadows Arborfield neighborhood in 1978. Their neighbors were Roger Postlethwaite, Taylor Woodrow's chief planner and general manager; Tom Brown, sales manager;

and Alan Shaw, the


company comptroller. Bill and Kathy remember when Honoré was just a construction road and the northern part of Glebe Farm Road did not exist. They provided many stories about country club life, citizen's patrol, Fourth of July fireworks at the shopping village, professional tennis tournaments, and the horse stables in the tennis center parking lot.

Louise Mitchell is another very early resident. She is 103 years old. In 1977, she bought a home in Woodmans Chart. In her interview,

Jo Evans provided the first interview for the project. Jo moved to The Meadows in 1990. Jo remembers tea with the Taylor family, Greenwood Stables horse farm, a vibrant social life centered around country club activities, and dining at the Dickens Restaurantlater the old The Meadows Fitness Center- demolished in 2023.



improvements enjoyed by the Community. Their interview provides interesting details about operations work in The Meadows. Over the years, upgrades and improvements to The Meadows physical environment were made, including landscaping and beautification projects, tree trimming, installing street signs, repairing bridges and roads, constructing new irrigation systems, installing phone and computer wiring in the MCA building, and building the Nature Trail.

SAFETY REPORT...

WHAT ARE INCIDENTS AND CITATIONS?

Incidents are defined as a variety of complaints or concerns ranging from minor to more concerning activity reported by a resident. Examples of such (but not limited to) are; an alarm, animal and fishing complaints, reports of safety hazards, burglary, harassment, welfare check, dumping, solicitation or suspicious person(s).

Citations are violations
that do not respect our
documents related to
Meadows standards.
Examples of such are:
restricted vehicles, parking
violations, garbage cans not
being picked up or put out
too early, violations subject
to tow, and sign restrictions.

During the month of December, 2023 there were (17) incident free days – matching the total for November 2023. There were (20) reported incidents - (3) more than November 2023. There were (103) citations issued this month – (30) More than November 2023.

Safety responded to the following during the month of December:

THEFT

• December 28– Theft complaint in the Lyndhurst Community. The complainant reported that on December 27, at approximately 10:46 am Fed Ex made a delivery and shortly thereafter the item was retrieved from outside the residence by an unknown male. The security system provided video of the incident and was reviewed by Safety. The resident was advised to contact the Sarasota Ccounty Sheriff's Office of the incident.

SUSPICIOUS PERSON

• December 18 – Suspicious Person complaint on the 2800 block of Wrenwood Court. The complainant reported that at approximately 11:40 am, she received notification from her RING alarm system that the perimeter of her residence had been breached. She accessed the cameras to her residence only to observe an unknown female peering through the windows. The complainant attempted to communicate with the unknown female but was unsuccessful. A Meadows Safety Patrol Officer arrived at the residence, performed a perimeter check and phoned the complainant to asure her that there was nothing suspicious to report at that time.

SUSPICIOUS VEHICLE

 December 14 – Suspicious Vehicle complaint on the 5200 block of Everwood Run. The complainant reported that at approximately 5:00 am, for the past three (3) days, he's observed a suspicious vehicle parked nearby. He stated that due to the time of day, it's dark and he was unable to give the make, model or color. However, he did state that it was a large pick-up truck with a diesel engine. He stated each time he approaches that area the driver starts the engine and drives away. He was instructed not to approach the vehicle, contact Safety in the event he should observe the same vehicle again. Safety would be advised of the incident.

SUSPICIOUS INCIDENT - (PHONE CALL)

• December 5 – Suspicious
Incident occurred on the 4700
block of Greencroft Road. The
complainant reported she
received a phone call from a
person (male voice) identifying
themselves as being from
Meadows Safety. She stated
the person called her by first
name which startled her. She
stated when inquiring why they
were calling the voice trailed off
but indicated it was concerning
a house and hung up. The
complainant was asked if she

would provide the phone number of the caller and she complied. The number was crosschecked with those employed by Meadows Safety and it did not match any on file. The complainant was informed of this and it was recommended that she file a report with Sarasota Ccounty Sheriff's Office.

VANDALISM INCIDENTDecember 12 – Vandalism

Incident occurred on the 2700 block of Goodwood Court. The complainant reported she attended a Christmas party during the evening at approximately 4:45pm. She stated that it was at this time she set the timer for her Christmas lights on the exterior of her residence. She stated that upon her return, she noticed the lights were inoperable. On the morning of December 13, she stated she inspected the lights on the exterior, more specifically the walkway and noticed there were multiple places where the wires appeared to have been severed. Photos were taken and a written report submitted. The complainant was instructed to contact this office and or the Sarasota Ccounty Sheriff's Office should it occur again.

TRAFFIC INCIDENT

• December 3 – Traffic Incident occurred on the 5100 block of Everwood Run. The complainant reported at approximately 2:50 pm, observing late model VW sedan traveling across his lawn. The vehicle completed a semicircle on the lawn before driving towards Honore. The complainant was instructed that if the vehicle appeared again to contact Sarasota Ccounty Sheriff's Office and Safety.

FISHING INCIDENT

• December 12 – Fishing complaint at the 6th hole on the Highlands Golf Course. At approximately 7:25 pm, Safety observed both a male and female seated at the pond with fishing poles in hand.
Once the suspects noticed Safety approaching, they grabbed their belongings and began swiftly walking away. Safety returned to the vehicle and attempted to locate the suspects but was unsuccessful.

n November and December of 2023 - over 120 lucky Meadows residents got a sneak peek of what's to come at Mote's Science Education Aquarium at Nathan Benderson Park. They joined Mote staff in Mote's SEA construction trailer and heard about plans for the many exciting exhibits and the latest timetable from Mote's Vice President of Aquarium Dan Bebak and Michael Moore, Special Advisor to the Office of the President.

Then groups of 5 donned construction safety vests, hard hats and glasses and toured the site by golf cart getting up close and personal with the immensity of the project. These two days of tours for The Meadows community was the largest tour conducted at the site so far. It's safe to say that everyone left feeling excited about their future neighbors, human or otherwise.

Later in December, Mote Marine Laboratory & Aquarium came one step closer in realizing its vision of significantly improving access to marine science education

and technology for all, as it held a topping off ceremony for its new Mote Science Education Aquarium (Mote SEA).

"The topping off ceremony

is a major milestone for our entire Mote family and communities throughout the region to celebrate how close we are to witnessing the truly transformative nature of experiential science learning opportunities that over 100,000 school children and nearly a million visitors will experience every year within these walls," says Dr. Michael P. Crosby, Mote President & CEO. "Mote SEA will transform our ability to provide informal science education and enhanced levels of ocean literacy to much larger and more diverse populations locally and from around the world. The impacts of Mote SEA will be seen and heard far and wide. Mote SEA

is no ordinary building and is much more than

just an aquarium.

Mote SEA is

an innovative.

ocean science education center bridging the gap between paradigm changing research and science education access for everyone that will spark

opportunities and change."

From pre-K children to retired adults, from family-focused education programs to National Science Foundation-supported research internships and teacher professional development workshops, Mote SEA will tailor

marine science education for myriad audiences at every stage of life. Most importantly, Mote SEA will provide critical experiential science, technology,



engineering and math education in its three K-12 STEM teaching labs to 70,000 students from Sarasota and Manatee County schools, and family day passes to 24,000 Title 1 schools each year, free of charge.

"Mote SEA will expand education access and participation of learners, including populations that are underserved in our community or underrepresented in marine science and technology. Whether Mote is encouraging girls to excel in scientific



fields, involving at-risk youth in ocean technology product development, or engaging local communities in volunteer citizen science projects, Mote SEA will provide hands-on marine science and technology research experience opportunities that reach far and serve all," says Aly Busse, Associate Vice President, Mote Education.



Mote Science Education Aquarium one step closer to opening its doors.



Interactive teaching labs will be accessible to all schools in the region, including no-cost opportunities, so that each child has the chance to discover marine science and technology first-hand. Strategically collaborating with schools and community groups where needs are greatest, Mote will continue to educate students who might not otherwise have access to aguariums and marine science education. Students will dive into marine STEM in three teaching labs on the first floor of Mote SEA.

Mote SEA won't just deepen students' education—it will also help bridge gaps between education and careers through four Workforce Development Labs on the second and third floors. In these labs, interns and program participants including high schoolers, undergraduate and graduate students will gain technical skills, hands-on research experience, and careerbuilding networking opportunities by working alongside Mote scientist mentors on their ongoing projects.

Heading into 2024, the construction team will begin to install the remaining large-scale acrylic panels for the balance of the main habitats throughout Mote SEA. In addition, a complex network

of plumbing and life support systems, necessary to breathe life into the one million gallons of habitat throughout the facility, will begin to take shape.

It is anticipated that the certificate of occupancy (C.O.)—a formal approval from Sarasota County certifying that Mote SEA meets all required construction requirements and is safe for occupation—will be applied for in late summer 2024. Once the C.O. is issued, Mote aquarium biologists can undertake Mote's thorough transport and acclimation process for the wide array of animals that will ultimately call Mote SEA home.

Perhaps most exciting is the anticipated opening of the facility, which remains on schedule for early 2025, when Mote will realize its vision for offering a window of discovery into the globally-significant marine science research conducted by Mote scientists across every ocean in the world.

Mote is pleased to be recognized by the Tampa Bay Business Journal as the #1 revenue-

generating cultural nonprofit in the entire Tampa Bay region. The ranking is based on approximately \$44 million in revenue in 2022 by Mote.

For nearly seven decades, Mote

has conducted world-class innovative research, technology development and science education around the world with a broader mission to positively impact restoration, conservation and sustainable use of ocean and coastal ecosystems, while also enhancing the overall ocean literacy of the public. With more than 27 diverse marine research, technology development and conservation programs conducted by over 40 PhD-level scientists, and more than 300 total staff members, Mote also has eight operational campuses, stretching from Tampa Bay to Key West, including the public outreach arm of Mote's research, Mote Aquarium.



An Unlikely Place for a Shrine

ho would have guessed congested corner of University and Honore, there is an unlikely shrine to a legendary American hero? The shrine and the hero's fame and name have both somehow endured throughout the years.

In our society filled with instant celebrities and one-hit wonders, Andy Warhol's well-known quote usually rings true. But there are exceptions. This hero, whose faded countenance shines through the cracks and wear of age on a bench adjoining the CVS here, has been remembered far more than fifteen minutes; he is still remembered over 37,000,000 minutes since he first came to prominence during the early 1950s.

The ancient, worn Herald Tribune cover picturing the hero has the years. But the shrine and the hero have been resilient and are still available for a pilgrimage.

Although it has been fifty-five

years since this hero has retired and almost three decades since he died, the fascination with him by his generation and the two generations before and after has never subsided. It was more than his seven World Championships, his tape-measure home runs, and all his memorable exploits on the field. It was more than his All-American smile and his name you loved to repeat over and over. Mickey Mantle was the symbol of the optimism of our youth, flawed though he and the times were.

Sportscaster Bob Costas described him as "a fragile hero to whom we had an emotional attachment so strong and lasting that it defied logic." And the fact that this shrine has persevered also defies logic.

Who would have guessed?



Did You Know 2023 Was Our Warmest & Driest Year?

Roy Wysnewski — December Weather Analysis in The Meadows

Yearly Temperature and Rainfall Summary: In reviewing weather data recorded in the Meadows over the past ten years, 2023 was our warmest and driest year. The average daytime temperature recorded for the year was 89 degrees Fahrenheit (F), two degrees higher than the previous high - 87 F set in 2020. Although rainfall exceeded normal in December, the yearly total was two-thirds of normal, and represents the least amount recorded during the ten-year period.



highest ever recorded in the Meadows.] Other statistics for December include fourteen above-normal temperature days and five record high-temperature days.

Rainfall Analysis: December's rainfall total was above normal. However, the drought that gripped coastal southwest Florida for much of 2023 reduced the year's total to 34.6 inches -- two-thirds the yearly average of 51.5 inches, and the least since a total of 34.1 inches was recorded in 2008.



The Write Stuff

Goin' Down the Road Feelin' Bad

One beautiful sunny Virginia spring morning in 1989 I was on my usual thirty-mile commute from Williamsburg to Hampton and entered onto a short stretch of Interstate 64 eastbound that would take me to my exit for Thomas Nelson Community College. I-64 was a four-lane stretch there, and sorely needed space for frequent heavy traffic situations; this was one of those mornings that had traffic building already at 8:30. I maneuvered my black Chevy S-10 Blazer - with its hip after-market pinstriping - into the left lane, which had fewer cars spaced better, and would allow me to move more safely before my exit from the right lane about a mile ahead. Traffic tooled along at 60 or so, though the posted speed was 55. I usually split the difference in that kind of situation. About a car-and-ahalf space ahead of me was the next vehicle, and I was slowing to put more space there, not in any particular rush since my first appointment was at 9:00. Plenty of time.

A number of things then happened in quick succession: A mid-size convertible with its top down and two women in the front seat with head scarves blowing in the wind abruptly pulled right in front of me at full speed.

Bad move!

Worse, the driver immediately hit her brakes hard as if to come to a stop.

Really bad move!

No time. I had to bail. The steady stream of traffic to my right offered no safe place to go, so nursing my brake, I got onto the inner berm as much as possible, hoping to avoid or minimize vehicle contact, and slowing enough that the car ahead moving faster left some space for me to swerve back onto my lane.

Or not.

As I watched, "Brake Lady" just kept on going and my left wheels caught in the soft grassy margin beyond the berm and took control of my vehicle, my

direction, and my life as well as the lives of the others around me in the rapid traffic. I got control again and tried moving back into the lane I'd just left. It didn't work. The speed, wobbling vectors from disengaging from the grass, and a sudden tilt to the right snatched control again.

I found my Blazer suddenly airborne, spiraling forward like a football, tilting inexplicably, as if in slow motion, over on to its right side. It started down to hit the pavement with that side, again seeming in slow motion. My mind silently shouted, "Lean into the center! Lean into the center!" I did so, rolling my right side onto the center console as far as possible, keeping my head down and gripping the wheel, the rest of me loose in my seatbelt as the truck landed on its right side, bounced high, went airborne again, and completed one or two pavement rolls that ended with my side door against the paving of the right berm, me facing forward hanging in my harness, and the shattered right window beyond me facing up into the sky.

Things got very quiet.

I took inventory of myself, did not feel any serious or even dull pain, could move my neck, legs, and arms in the cramped space, and was neither dizzy nor disoriented. I just was on the interstate, hanging in my seat harness, unable to leverage myself into any other position except a sort of fetal one. The only ache was from trying to keep my head square to my shoulders while gravity argued it down into the broken side window glass. Ya-dadoo-de-doo.... Hm. Hm. Hmmmm. Not much happening, eh? What

Suddenly a face appeared in the warped open space of the passenger window, framed by the bright blue sky.

"You look okay! Hang on! I called 911 and they're on the way! Don't move!" said the woman, loud but calm and reassuring. She followed with "I'm a nurse graduate of Thomas Nelson and can help you,

if necessary, but you should stay right where you are for the EMTs. We can't get this door open, and your roof looks pretty banged in."

So "I" was now "we." Good. Progress. Hm!

I was disassociating.

A man's face appeared over her shoulder. "I'm from TNCC Nursing too! On my way to campus for papers. You're a lucky man, buddy! You've also got traffic snarled back at least a mile. No one else involved, it looks like." I recalled Scarf Headed Brake Lady and started wondering how her day at the beach was going. Sharks came to mind.

An unseen man joined behind the two puppet-like faces in my opening. "Hey I'm from Thomas Nelson too, saw your TNCC parking sticker, and thought I could... hey I had you for English! Mr. Bruno! How you doing, man?"

Here's how my mind was doing: "What the hell is this, a reunion?" "And how the heck do you think I'm doing?" My next thought was, "I sure as hell hope I passed that guy!" My next thought, "Gee we sure do make an impact in this community!" There were two situations happening: my wreck and a TNCC event. Not able to do much about the former, I'd disassociated into the latter.

Sirens weaved their way from the last intersection and cleared the reunion crowd away, got traffic secured, and EMTs and State Police assessed things through my hatch to the outer world. All agreed that I looked fairly unscathed except for some blood on my face. Preliminary in-place triage assessment supported removing me from the vehicle and transporting me to nearby Riverside Hospital. Actually, they had to remove the vehicle from me. When the roof had hit the pavement in one of the rolls, it partly collapsed, and the glasshouse frame was bent such that no door would open. The Jaws of Life were brought, my head was covered for protection, and the windshield cracked thoroughly but held as

Shock took over on that ride. A whirl of sirens, rapid movement,

motion. No fault. My only injury was a surface cut where my dark glasses' nose piece had broken the skin during the tumbling. I was otherwise safe and was released after a few hours observation and tests. I considered my earlier in-roll actions, surprised at them. I wondered why I'd done what I had done. I recalled that two weekends before, there had been a horrible accident at the busy intersection near our neighborhood. A woman had lost her life because part of her had been hanging out of the car when it rolled on her. "Lean in! Lean in!" had stayed in me


somewhere deep, and in its own voice it rushed out exhorting the precisely right move at precisely the right moment. Out of that

"TNCC, eh? We've got you, buddy, you're in great care. I took classes there," from a male voice. And then I was lifted into the ambulance for the short ride to the hospital.

whirling through the ER area, next aware that I was in a hospital room and my wife Susan was there, having been called at work by someone from either the hospital or the college, which had been informed of my situation. Probably a couple dozen phone calls hit TNCC, judging from the pavement party we'd had. The truck was a total wreck. Thank God Chevy "built it tough." Toughly, yes, though stupidly: the State Police, the insurance agent, and the ER doctor concurred that those small Blazers and other SUVs were built top-heavy with a tendency and habit to tip over at the slightest non-forward

lady's tragedy my family's was prevented. R.I.P., Ma'am! I have had several occasions in my life that suggest to me there's a purpose to my existence for which I get repeated passes on the alternative. So far, at least. I'm grateful for whatever that purpose is and hope that I do achieve it or have achieved it.


