President's Desk

There's definitely a buzz in the air...

Have you noticed the energy and excitement in the air around The Meadows? It's more than the usual signs of spring. I attribute a good deal of the positive air to feelings of accomplishment on the part of residents and associations who are completing or just getting started on plans to fix up and spruce up their properties. You can really notice a difference as you travel around the community. At the MCA we're continuing to work on our plans to beautify Longmeadow. You'll be hearing more about that in the next few months.

I want to thank the residents I've seen recently who are stopping to pick up after others who leave trash behind or pick up debris that has fallen from trees onto walkways or into ponds. The MCA staff appreciates the extra helping hands, and it is a great sign that you care about The Meadows. One word of caution: check around for signs of gators or snakes before you reach into a pond to retrieve anything.

Country club update

As you probably know, the MCA purchased the loans Synovus Bank held on The Meadows Country Club on March 16. This is step one in our plan to strengthen the community by enhancing the financial security of the club. MCA and country club teams are working together to develop plans that more closely align our operations and create new programs and activities to bring more revenue into the club operations—and provide more amenities for residents.

We are also talking to developers and other experts on how to make best use of the 32-acre parcel of land surrounding the clubhouse that has been rezoned for development. Part of the plan will include updating some existing club facilities and building some new recreational and wellness facilities that will be available to both club members and residents. There will also be some residential units built in this area. We are asking developers to focus on developing housing that meets our goal of adding value to The Meadows in two ways: producing the maximum value from the sale of our land and maximizing the property values of our existing homes. It seems that some of the larger buildings we originally envisioned on the property aren't attractive to developers in today's market, so we are exploring other options.

I know it's difficult for many of you to believe after the plans that were discussed last year, but we are not considering building on any of the golf courses. Our green space is too important to us and it is one of the things our residents value the most. We don't want to touch it. All 54 holes of golf will remain open. It is what makes The Meadows unique and we plan to capitalize on that.

No major changes are planned for our tennis program. We plan to promote the fact that The Meadows is home to one of the best tennis facilities in Florida and to take steps to make it even more attractive.

Meadows activities

We won't need to wait for building programs and major changes to see exciting activities. The Meadows' photo show and art show were both put on by Meadows residents for Meadows residents. Both were impressive events that highlighted the talents of our folks. Meadows "U" has offered programs that have drawn record audiences. In the future, we will offer more programs and will work with the country club to offer a broader range of topics and events.

We also had our first-ever car show, the brainchild of Meadows resident Jim Rutushni. This is a great example of how a single resident can bring an idea to the MCA staff and get the go ahead and support needed to make it a reality. So if you are thinking "I wish we had a _____ group" just step up and bring the idea

forward. If others are interested in the idea, we will see if we can help you make it happen.

For those of you who are leaving The Meadows for a part or all of the summer, I strongly encourage you to sign up for our Constant Contact emails. Simply call **Lisa Compton** at the MCA office and give her your email address. That will assure you get the news on what's happening here in Florida while you are away. I hope we don't have any weather emergencies, but Constant Contact is our first line of communications in a hurricane and the best way to make sure your house and your friends are all safe.

This summer we will also be restructuring our communications program. Communications Director **Carlene Cobb** is working with a team of volunteers to develop a plan to better integrate electronic media into our strategic marketing and communications campaigns. Safety

Prevention is the best protection

All residents encouraged to attend

During the month of March 2018, there were 43 reported incidents, 16 less than in February. There were eight incident-free days. There were 188 citations issued this month for various violations such as illegally parked vehicles, garbage violations, and open garage doors.

While most of the incidents reported in March were fairly routine, there was one incident that was not.

Burglary—Auto: On Friday, March 23, 2018 a resident of Harpers Croft reported that sometime overnight, person(s) unknown entered his *unlocked* vehicle and rummaged through the interior. An old cell phone was taken.

Crimes of opportunity

It is impossible to predict where and when a thief is going to strike next. As is the case with almost all of these crimes of opportunity, the car was unlocked. While a pair of sunglasses, an old cell phone and a few dollars in change doesn't seem like much, it is a crime nonetheless. If you leave your vehicle unlocked overnight in a parking area or driveway, you invite thieves looking for an easy score.

Our Safety Patrol can't be everywhere, and thieves are mobile, often on bicycles and they make no noise getting into an unlocked car. It's a quick and easy crime and the owner doesn't know it occurred until much later. How do we stop them? Just hit the lock button on your remote. The thief will move on to another car that is unlocked. The Sheriff's Office encourages all residents to report auto break-ins when they occur. Reporting this type of crime helps them apprehend the perpetrators.

Crime Prevention Triangle

In past articles, I have talked about the Crime Prevention Triangle theory that Law Enforcement uses for education. In essence, for any crime to occur, you need three parts, *Desire, Ability* and *Opportunity*. By eliminating any one of these elements a crime cannot occur. We as citizens cannot remove a criminal's *desire* to commit a crime. Nor can we affect his *ability* to commit a crime. But if we take away the *Opportunity*, we



remove that side of the triangle and the crime cannot occur. If the criminal does not have an unlocked vehicle or an unlocked door or window, we have taken away that type of opportunity. **Just lock it up!!**

Register your home

Recently a Meadows resident asked me if the Safety Patrol will hold the house keys of a homeowner who goes out of town. The short answer is, no they will not. What they will do however, is keep a close eye on your home and increase patrols around your immediate area. Just give the Safety Office a call at 809-0084 to let him know when you will be out of town.

So, how else can a homeowner increase security of their home when they are away?

Meadows residents can also register their homes with the Sheriff's Office Crime Prevention Unit. Having a home registered with the Sheriff's Office is particularly helpful to the Sheriff's Deputies when trying to contact a homeowner who might be away. We have quite a few snowbirds here in The Meadows and homes are unoccupied for months at a time. Sometimes, contact with the homeowner would be necessary for things other than crimes such as property damage from weather, fire and accidents of different sorts.

You don't have to be a snowbird to take advantage of this service. All Meadows residents are encouraged to register. This service started primarily for homeowners to register their alarms, but it its extremely helpful to the deputies responding to an address to be able to contact a homeowner when no one is home. A call to the office manager at the Sarasota Sheriff's Crime Prevention Unit, 861-4084, will get the necessary forms and stickers to the homeowner. Even if you don't have an alarm on your property, it is a deterrent for a thief to see an official sticker from the Sheriff's Office displayed. And best of all, it's free.

Speeding on our streets

Almost every month at the Safety Committee meetings, we have residents who report cars speeding through their neighborhoods. One of the streets that is particularly sensitive to speeding traffic is the east side of Ringwood Meadow from the traffic circle down to Pinebrook Hollow. This section of Ringwood Meadow has single-family homes lining both sides of the street. The residents who live there are extremely concerned

that there will be a serious accident or someone struck because the driver did not obey the speed limit.

In an effort to help slow traffic through that neighborhood, the MCA reduced the speed limit to 20 mph and installed two electronic speed detection signs. While this has had a positive effect on reducing the vast majority of speeding vehicles, there are still those who disobey the posted speed limit signs. Other Meadows neighborhoods have a similar problem with speeding vehicles as well. Marsh Field Road North currently is utilizing one of these electronic signs now. Please obey the posted speed limits on all streets in The Meadows. Our residents' safety is the first priority in The Meadows. Please, just slow it down.

Bicycles should stop, too!

You hear about cars striking bicycle riders from time to time, but you don't think it can happen to you.

The Meadows has nice, wide sidewalks to ride on and we seldom have to go into street traffic. When we go out for a leisurely bike ride, we often just enjoy the surroundings and getting some exercise. We kind of forget that we are a moving vehicle, too. Our sidewalk on Longmeadow was widened so that walkers and bicyclists could all enjoy it. But remember that the sidewalk you are riding on crosses some streets and driveways.

Cars have the right of way if there is no traffic control device to stop them. The intersection of Longmeadow and Highlands Bridge Road is one such intersection where a bicyclist should be extra cautious. Despite the big stop sign, riders often blow right through that intersection without even looking at the traffic. We have had some close calls with our bike riders not paying attention here. Please, play it safe and always stop bicycles at stop signs.


Words to the wise about Medicare card scams

In an article published last year, I warned residents about new Medicare card fraud that became prevalent as soon as the government announced it was sending out Medicare cards. One of our scam-savvy residents asked to see this information again.

Medicare card scams are out there...

Medicare will begin to mail new Medicare cards between April 2018 and April 2019. Your new card will have a new Medicare number that's unique to you,

instead of your Social Security number. This will help to protect your identity which is a long overdue



security improvement. The new card won't change your coverage or your benefits. You don't need to take any action to get your new Medicare card. Medicare will never contact you for your Medicare number or other personal information. Do not share your Medicare number or other personal information with anyone who contacts you by phone, email, or by approaching you in person, unless you've given them permission in advance.

The government's Medicare card issue program is automatic. There's no need for you to do anything; you will receive it in the mail. Telephone calls you may get that claim you have to pay a fee, that your benefits may be cancelled, or that request your Social Security number are all scams. Just hang up on them.

Scammers impersonate the Social Security Administration

Your Social Security number

is an important key for an identity thief. Scammers want it, and they think of all sorts of ways to trick you into giving it away. The Federal



Trade Commission is getting reports about calls from scammers claiming to be from the Social Security Administration. They say there has been a computer

problem, and they need to confirm your Social Security number. Other people have reported that they have come across spoof websites that look like the place where you would apply for a new Social Security card—but these websites are actually a setup to steal your personal information.

If you get a phone call or are directed to a website other than *ssa.gov* that claims to be associated with the Social Security Administration, don't respond. It's most likely a scam.

Here are some tips to deal with these government imposters:

1. Don't give the caller your information. Never give out or confirm sensitive information—like your bank account, credit card, or Social Security number—unless you know who you're dealing with.

If someone has contacted you, you can't be sure who they really are.

2. Don't trust a name or number. Con artists use official-sounding names so you will trust them. To

make their call seem legitimate, scammers use internet technology to spoof their area code—so although it may seem they are calling from Washington, DC, they could be calling from anywhere in the world.

3. Check with the Social Security Administration. The SSA has a warning about these scams and suggests you contact them directly at 1-800-772-1213 to verify the reason for the contact and the person's identity prior to providing any information to the caller.

If you come across one of these scams, please report it to the Social Security Administration's Fraud Hotline at 1-800-269-0271.

Polite versus rude

Senior citizens are known for their extraordinary politeness. It's just the way we were raised. Even in this high pressure telemarketing age we live in, we still have a tendency to answer the telephone and be polite to the person giving

us an unwanted sales pitch on the other end of the phone. Many of us listen patiently to the sales pitch and, worse, some of us agree to buy whatever they are

selling. Unfortunately, seniors get taken advantage of because they are so polite. So what can we do to protect ourselves from those unwanted telemarketer calls? Here's some info that might help.

How to handle an unexpected sales call

Questions to ask

When you get a call from a telemarketer, ask yourself:

1. Who's calling...and why?

The law says telemarketers must tell you it's a sales call, the name of the seller and what they're selling before they make their pitch. If you don't hear this information, say "no thanks," and get off the phone.

2. What's the hurry?

Fast talkers who use high pressure tactics could be hiding something. Take your time. Most legitimate businesses will give you time and written information about an offer before asking you to commit to a purchase.

3. If it's free, why are they asking me to pay?

Question fees you need to pay to redeem a prize or gift. Free is free. If you have to pay, it's a purchase—not a prize or a gift.

4. Why am I "confirming" my account information—or giving it out?

Some callers have your billing information before they call you. They're trying to get you to say "okay" so they can claim you approved a charge.

5. What time is it?

The law allows telemarketers to call only between 8 am and 9 pm. A seller calling earlier or later is ignoring the law.

6. Do I want more calls like this one?

If you don't want a business to call you again, say so and register your phone number on the **National Do Not Call Registry.** If they call back, they're breaking the law.

Some Additional Guidelines

- Resist pressure to make a decision immediately.
- Keep your credit card, checking account, or Social Security numbers to yourself. Don't give them to callers you don't know—

even if they ask you to "confirm" this information. That's a trick.

- Don't pay for something just because you'll get a "free gift."
- Get all information in writing before you agree to buy.

What to do about pre-recorded calls

If you answer the phone and hear a recorded message instead of a live person, it's a **robocall**. Recorded messages that are trying to sell you something are generally illegal unless you have given the company written permission to call you.

If you get a robocall:

Hang up the phone. Don't press 1 to speak to a live operator or any other key to take your number off the list. If you respond by pressing any number, it will probably just lead to more robocalls.

Consider asking your phone company whether they charge for blocking phone numbers. Remember that telemarketers change Caller ID information easily and often, so it might not be worth paying a fee to block a number that will change.

Report your experience to the FTC online or by calling 1-888-382-1222.

If you get phone service through internet or cable, you might want to look into services that screen and block robocalls. Try doing an online search for "block robocalls."

Alert of the month

Join the National Do Not Call List

Register your home and mobile phone numbers with the **National Do Not Call Registry.** This won't stop all unsolicited calls, but it will stop most. The Do Not Call Registry accepts registrations from both cell phones and land lines. To register by telephone, call **1-888-382-1222.** You must call from the phone number that you want to register.

If your number is on the registry and you still get calls, they're probably from scammers ignoring the law. Hang up, and report them at www.donotcall.gov.

Look at what's trending today...

Emergency Prep Committee

Be prepared and stay safe

After a devastating hurricane season for the United States in 2017, forecasters predict the upcoming hurricane season will be near normal to slightly above-normal, with 12 to 15 tropical storms. Of those storms, six to eight are forecast to become hurricanes and three to five are forecast to become major hurricanes.

Last year, we had 17 tropical storms. This year may not be quite as active. Similar to last year, sea surface temperatures are expected to remain warmer than normal across most of the basin and normal to above normal over the main developmental region, where more than 85 percent of all tropical storms form. Warm water creates more favorable conditions for tropical storm development.

While last year brought six impacts to the United States, including Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands, this year is more likely to result in three or four. Conditions are ripe for early season development in the Gulf of Mexico due to warm water already in place in that part of the Atlantic basin. Can a major hurricane make a direct hit on Sarasota? You bet it can. Hurricane Irma's path last September had Sarasota firmly in her sights. We were spared massive devastation here, but others were not so lucky.

The first 48 hours are on us

The Emergency Prep Committee knows that the first 48 hours after a storm has passed may be difficult for outside agencies to get into The Meadows to help. First responders will be busy throughout the county, and we might have to fend for ourselves for some time. Our volunteers will go out into the community after the storm has passed to inspect and report damage and medical emergencies to our Command Center at the MCA. Those of us in the Command Center will send assistance to the area as needed. We will all have to depend on each other. We were exceptionally proud of our volunteers in the aftermath of Hurricane Irma—The Meadows community really pulled together.

Have a plan

All of us should have a plan. In other words: If you had to evacuate, what would you take with you? Where would you go? Will you go to a shelter? If you stay home, how will you deal with a storm that may knock your power and water service out. Do you have hurricane shutters? Can you install them by yourself? You want to prepare for the worst case scenario that's called having a hurricane plan.

The time to do this is now

It's not very likely that we will experience any hurricane activity

before the summer months. So now is the time to stock up on supplies. You can easily buy cases of bottled water now to store in your garage or pantry. There won't be any left on the supermarket shelves at the last minute. Also, about a day before the hurricane is scheduled to arrive, put as many bottles in the freezer as you can safely fit. They will freeze (but not burst), and can then be moved to an ice chest to replace expensive bags of ice. Remember, an average person needs about a gallon of water a day for drinking and food preparation. Don't forget to stock enough water for your pets, too!

You'll need batteries and batterypowered lanterns if your power goes out. Keep enough food and supplies on hand to last at least 72 hours. If you really want to prepare for the storm, have at least one week of food and water on hand for your family. Remember, your microwave won't work. Do you have a full tank of propane for your grill?

Stay or go?

One of the most difficult decisions is whether to stay put and ride out the storm at home or evacuate and take your chances on the highways. As you decide to either stay or go, there are several factors that should help you make your decision:

- How big and powerful is the storm? There's a huge difference in a small, Category One hurricane and a monster Category Five!
- Do you have a place to go should you choose to evacuate? Do you know where the shelters are along your evacuation path?
- How secure is your home, and how safe do you believe you will be if you don't evacuate? How prepared are you to care for yourself before, during, and after a storm and possible protracted power outage?

People with special needs

As part of Sarasota County's disaster preparation, the respective Office of Emergency Management maintains a "People with Special Needs" Registration program designed for:

- People who have physical or mental conditions or limitations such as having or being: visually or hearing impaired, wheelchair bound, or have respiratory problems.
- People who need help with daily living activities such as eating, bathing or mobility.
- People who are dependent on medications or medical treatment such as oxygen, electric life support or dialysis.
- People who are bedridden and

require custodial care upon the advice of a personal physician if evacuated.

• People who need transportation to a shelter in case of a disaster because they may live alone or without support of family, friends or neighbors.

Complete the proper application at the MCA

You must pre-register for a special needs evacuation center placement as soon as possible. Registration applications are reviewed, then the applicant is assigned to appropriate facilities that meet their medical needs or conditions including:

> Red Cross Shelters Special Needs Shelter Nursing homes or hospitals (as arranged in advance by your physician)

- The county's Special Needs Shelters provides cots, meals, oxygen and volunteer medical personnel to assist with medication/ oxygen administration, mobility and monitoring of stable medical conditions.
- Registration does not guarantee assignment to a Special Needs Shelter. The Special Needs Program cannot provide 24-hour skilled care.
- Those who require skilled medical care on a 24-hour basis should contact their medical professional to make arrangements if hospital or nursing home admission will be required.
- If you, or someone you know, needs to be registered in the Special Needs Program, please call the Office of Emergency Management in the county where you reside and request a PSN registration packet.

The MCA will have these forms on hand as well as the Sarasota County Disaster Planning Guide and other information that will be helpful in your hurricane planning.



Alligators contribute significantly to ecology and to our economy

When MCA must remove an alligator, it will be killed...

It's not unusual for Meadows residents to call The Meadows Community Association to report a concern about an alligator lolling in the sun nearby, according to MCA General Manager Frances **Rippcondi**. Sometimes, the caller reports a major issue, such as an alligator crossing through The Meadows Shopping Village to get from one pond to another, or an animal on someone's back stoop. Usually, it's just the presence of an alligator in one of more than 100 water bodies in The Meadows that's being reported. For some people, it may be scary to have an alligator nearby, and many callers just want "the powers that be" to catch the unwelcome visitor and relocate it.

"That's easier said than done," says Kyle Mader, a biological scientist specializing in alligators and crocodiles in the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) North Florida Alligator Field office in Eustis. His agency receives 16,000 to 20,000 nuisance alligator complaints each year, but only removes a small number. "Relocating alligators to remote areas that already have an established alligator social structure would likely cause fighting, which would possibly result in the death of the resident alligator or the relocated alligator," Mader explains.

Quite often a relocated alligator will just move back to the pond or lake from which it was taken. So the alligator you report can be removed, but in almost every case it will be killed and its hide and meat sold. Is that all right? Should we want to keep alligators in The Meadows' ponds?

Meadows Water and Wildlife Committee Chairman and Mote Marine Laboratory Marine Biologist **Bob Hueter**. PhD says. "Absolutely we should! Like sharks in the ocean, alligators in Florida lakes and ponds are 'top predators,' which is to say, they occupy the top of the food web." Dr. Hueter lives on Everwood Run, and he heads Mote Marine Laboratory's shark research unit. "In fact, alligators have been known to ambush deer, Florida panthers and black bears. They help maintain the ecological balance and long-term environmental health of Florida water bodies. Without them, prey species may overpopulate, leading to overuse of available resources

and even disease. With alligators, the weak and sick prey animals are culled, and even exotic species like tilapia fish are held in check. The result, with an alligator in most ponds, is a healthier and more aesthetically

more aesthetically pleasing system," says Dr. Hueter.

Mader cites
ecological and
economic reasons
to appreciate the
presence of alligators.
"They are considered
ecosystem engineers,"
he says. "They build
caves and holes and
the females build
nests, which can
help with increasing
plant diversity. They
construct nests from

many different materials, mostly grasses and mud, which they mound up above the waterline. These nests later may provide a nesting habitat for turtles and amphibians. Alligators provide a real benefit to the ecosystem."


Florida is home for 1.3 million alligators, second only to Louisiana in state alligator population. Alligators deliver an obvious economic benefit to our state—tourists come here to see alligators. They visit parks, where you can see alligators, and enjoy airboat rides to get a closer look. According to Mader, operators of airboat tours and some golf course managers believe alligators contribute to their businesses and speak out for killing fewer alligators. Their most important economic benefit to humans in some areas may be the control of coypu, a large semiaquatic rodent also known as beaver rat, and muskrats, both of which contribute to shore erosion in ponds and wetlands.

Around 100 alligator farms across the state provide further evidence of the economic value of the large reptiles. Their hides are used for manufacturing luggage, handbags, shoes, belts and other leather items. Alligator meat is offered in many restaurants. In 2010, the Archbishop of New

Orleans ruled that for purposes of Catholic Church discipline in relation to abstention from meat, the flesh of the alligator is characterized as fish.

Alligators are found in

all 67 Florida counties. Once on the endangered species list, they are now considered "threatened," which means they can be hunted (in Florida only by individuals with proper licenses and permits). The FWC's nuisance alligator program permits the killing of about 7,000 alligators per year. The likelihood of a



- Do not swim or allow your pets to swim in wetlands or ponds where there may be alligators. Swimming in MCA water bodies is prohibited.
- Do not allow children or pets near these wetlands or ponds, especially at dusk or dawn.
- Always keep your dog on a leash outside, as MCA rules require.
- Do not approach an alligator, even if you just want to take a picture. Keep at least 30 to 50 feet away.
- Never feed an alligator. It is illegal. Do not leave anything edible outside your home that could attract them.
- Leave alligators alone. It is against the law to harass, kill or possess them.

Alligators become sexually active when they reach a size of six to seven feet. At that size, males are 8 to 12 years old and females are 10 to 15 years

old. The mating season begins in late April with courtship, when you may hear so-called "bellowing choruses." Groups of alligators bellow together for a few minutes a few times a day. Actual mating occurs in May and June. The female alligator lays eggs, and in summer, she builds a nest of vegetation where the decomposition of the vegetation provides the heat needed to incubate the eggs. The eggs hatch from mid-August to early September, and the mother often protects her young while they are around the nest. Alligators can be more aggressive during these months. The baby gators are very colorful compared to the drab coloration of the adults, and they communicate with the mother by making sounds that attract her attention. From a "clutch" of 35 alligator eggs, only about four will reach adulthood.

MCA's new Water and Wildlife Committee has developed detailed guidelines for handling alligator reports from residents. The Committee will evaluate every report by listening to the resident's concerns and reviewing a series of investigative questions, and then seeking input from Sunwest Waterway Management, the firm the MCA retains to maintain ponds and waterways throughout The Meadows. Based on the results of the investigation, the Committee will make a recommendation to the MCA on what action to take in response to the resident's concern. With its mission to "ecobeautify" The Meadows ponds and lakes, the Committee will be looking for tangible evidence of a true risk to residents before it will recommend removing and destroying this important ecological asset for our aquatic environment.

Community survey indicates continued high satisfaction level

Over 1,000 residents responded to the recent community survey sent to the MCA Constant Contact list of over 3,000 emails. The response rate of 33% is slightly higher than that in 2016. The survey confirmed the results of the 2016 survey. It indicated that 94% of respondents are either very satisfied or satisfied with living in the Meadows. Only 2% indicated dissatisfaction.

Your expectations for improvement

More than 750 respondents offered recommendations for improvements to the community. The country club, shopping village, activities and appearance are still as much on the minds of the community as they were in 2016. More than 75 percent of recommendations in the current survey were on those subjects compared to slightly under 70 percent in 2016. Most of the recommendations focused on the appearance of the shopping village, continued attention to the overall appearance of the community, a desire for more activities and, of course, the country club.

While the comments on the first three subjects were like those made in 2016, the one area where the recommendations varied related to the club. While the business aspect of the club is still the most commented upon subject, the recommendations have shifted from "saving the club" to "supporting the club." This makes sense since the MCA has stabilized the finances of the club.

An important aspect of your recommendations relating to the club is that you want more access including general access, access to dining and access to fitness. Once more this makes sense. Now that the community has more of a stake in the club, you want more access.

You noted improvements to the community

We asked if respondents had seen any improvements in the community. Over a third of you offered positive comments. A lot of respondents liked the new fountain

and landscaping at the 17th Street entrance. Still more have noticed the addition of new landscaping. sidewalks repairs, the new fence on athlete's Drive and, at last, improvements at the shopping village!

Communication is satisfactory

A large majority of respondents are satisfied with the communications they receive from MCA, with 57% very satisfied and less than 4% dissatisfied. There is very little variation in respondents' attitudes towards such communications by type of residence, duration of stay, or TMCC membership status.

Golf, fitness and dining out are still popular activities

Over 950 of those surveyed responded to questions on their golf, tennis, fitness and dining habits. About 40% of respondents reported that they play golf. Many play more than once per week. The same number report playing in the summer. Club members, of course, play mostly at the club. Non-members play at a lot of other places but mostly at nearby courses such as Bobby Jones, University Park and Legacy.

A surprising result is that only 14 percent of the respondents play tennis. More than half of the players play more than once a week and another tenth at least weekly. The majority play at the club, the rest at city and county facilities.

Use of a fitness facility was reported by 45 percent of respondents

The majority of those respondents (62 percent) reported using the fitness facility more than once a week. Another 19 percent go weekly. In addition to the Dickens, respondents reported using many other nearby locations.

Dining out at sit-down restaurants is a very popular activity for respondents with slightly more than half eating out more than once a week. Another 28 percent dine out at least weekly; 3 percent eat out every day!



Happy Anniversary

Things have changed a lot in the last thirty years. In 1988, we had big hair, big shoulder pads in our power suits and big, puffy bubble skirts for our evening wear. We wore parachute pants, jumpsuits, or velour leisure suits for causal occasions. We could walk around in our homes talking on cordless phones but only a few of us had one of the new car phones, and their mobility was limited—they were too big to fit in our purses. That was no real problem. We had fewer reasons to be connected then; the internet, as we know it, didn't exist. We still watched network TV, and in 1988 we were all laughing at a new show called "Roseanne." Here in The Meadows, women were going to the Ladies Craft Group. Oh, I guess not everything has changed.

This year is the 30th anniversary of The Meadows Craft Group. Pearls are the appropriate gift if you want to send something. According to *Top Anniversary*, "much like a 30-year marriage, pearls grow from a small speck into a treasure." The same might be said of The Meadows Craft Group.

Thirty years ago, **Ruth Johnson** started a craft group which met in a small room at the Dickens Center. It worked fine because only five or six women participated. According to a 2008 interview with **Joan Hogan**, who joined the group in 1989, decorating tee-shirts was a favorite activity. Joan soon suggested that they work on "saleable" items. "How many tee-shirts does anyone need?" reasoned Joan. The other members agreed and by November had


created enough items to hold a sale. The Meadows Country Club gave permission for the group to use the upper area in the Dickens Pub for a one-day sale. That first sale netted enough to donate \$400 to the Salvation Army and the tradition of charitable giving began.

The early days

During the 90s, the group began

meeting in the first MCA Community Center located in what is now the Meadows Shopping Village on Ringwood Meadow. Joyce Gallego

The annual craft sale was held at the same time as the garage sale, generating more interest for both events. The group was able to donate from \$500 to \$1000 annually to local charities and to provide occasional

extras like Easter bonnet favors for Pinecrest Nursing Home.

A new home

In 2005, the current MCA
Community Center on Longmeadow
opened and the Craft Group moved
into its new home. "We were so
excited. We were going to have
a closet!" said Joyce Gallegos.
Previously the crafters had to transport
all their supplies, tools and partially

completed crafts back and forth between their homes and the meeting room each week. In addition to the closet, there were windows and space to grow. Members had room to do the

popular crafts of the day—needlepoint, counted cross stitch, Swedish tapestry, decoupage, silk flower arranging and even jewelry making.

We began branching out. A selection of Attic Treasures, "slightly used but never abused," was added to the craft sale. We decided to add a bake sale, but the MCA had some reservations. Worries about health department regulations, allergic reactions, and liability issues held things up for a while, but eventually we were given permission to sell homemade foods as long as they were not consumed on the premises. There

is no record of any crafter grabbing a muffin or cookie just in time to keep it out of a customer's mouth, but we do know that several customers immediately returned to buy more baked goods because they had eaten all their goodies before they got home. We hope they did not take the first bite until after leaving the parking lot.

We realized that successful organizations don't just happen and that to keep growing we needed to do more than just make crafts. In, 2009 we added a treasurer, Carol Jensen. Harriet Hergenrother became our project manager/facilitator, **Dottie** Barr managed the inventory and Helene DiPuma and Joyce Gallegos handled publicity. I began writing four columns a year about the group for The Meadoword. When Editor Mary Jo Gord told us she would like to have pictures of our crafts, I began doing a column every month. Membership grew from 13 members in 2010 to 38 in 2013. By 2014, there were 53 members and since then 55 to 65 women have participated annually.

The new members brought new skills and ideas. Vicki Robley shared ideas gleaned from running a large craft bazaar for her church. Kathy Easley used knowledge from her military training for our inventory system. Professional crafters, Dottie Morissette, Peggy Stirling and Gigi Marlin, joined the group, taught us new skills and kept us current on the latest trends in addition to creating gorgeous products themselves.

Jewelry—we love to make it; you love to buy it. Our jewelry changes every year as we learn new techniques and adapt to changing styles. Regular customers have learned that they can count on us to have just the right thing to update their look or for a gift.

Greeting Cards—Don't believe anyone who says writing is going out of style. First came cards with photos of Sarasota. They were followed by cards with Iris fold designs, others with dried flowers or quilled designs, and three-dimensional cards. All are too pretty to throw away. They're hard to resist and some customers buy a year's supply.

Holiday decorations and household helps to make life easier are perennial favorites—package decorations, Christmas Tree ornaments, and stocking stuffers evoke the holiday spirit. Knitted dishcloths, hanging towels, microwave baked potato bags, microwave bowl holders and scrubbies appeal to our practical side.

Green crafts are "up-cycled" crafts that convert discards into desirable products, and they are very popular. We've made purses from cigar boxes, aluminum tabs from pop cans, chains of origami—folded, protectively-coated strips of paper and M&M bags. Lights inside empty wine bottles. Strips of paper rolled into beads. Transformed shells and pinecones.

| Grown into a treasure

For thirty years, the Craft Group has forged friendships and fun, fostered creativity and contributed to local charities. With the support of Meadows residents and the MCA, we've been able to have a successful sale each year. In thirty years the craft sale has grown from 3 tables to 3 rooms full of handcrafted delights. Contributions to local charities have increased from \$400 to \$7000 a year, totaling nearly \$45,000 since the first craft sale. Much like a pearl, a small group has grown into a treasure, strengthening the bonds of community and changing lives for the better.



Life Challenges

Life gives us many challenges, but by facing them we learn and become stronger. However, I always assumed that when I retired there would be few new, difficult challenges. But, now we are told that we should continue to seek out new challenges as part of aging well. I decided to challenge myself by writing books. After writing two books, I thought I was ready for a new challenge.

I found my next challenge one rainy day when we took our grandchildren to Jumpin' Fun for an afternoon on the trampolines. They were having so much fun that I decided to jump, too. I had taught trampoline as part of a gymnastics class at Marshall University for 10 years; how hard could it be. I tried a front drop, one

of the simplest skills. The bed of the trampoline came up much more quickly than I expected. I thought that maybe I had broken my nose. Then I did a simple seat drop perfectly... except that I locked my elbows at my sides when I hit the bed of the trampoline. Pain immediately shot through my body and I thought that I had dislocated a shoulder. I vacated the trampoline and turned in my pass

with my remaining good arm. "Did this involve grandchildren or was it some senior citizens gone wild?" the doctor asked after examining me.

In the story below Gretchen tells about her airborne challenge. As for me, I think I will stick to tamer activities like Sudoku.

Learning to Fly

Learn something new to deter the crumbling of an aging brain. Then you'll avoid mentally matching body disintegration. That's what we elders are told. I might have gone too far when, at age 75, I set out to become a pilot.

I thought I'd be ahead of the game, having driven a vintage racecar through many forays into the Colorado mountains 25 years before. I had had a high speed, engine-driven, vehicle under me; felt the adrenaline and knew I was fearless.

In my early twenties, I'd been bitten by the aviation bug when our family was stationed at Langley Air Force Base and flight instruction could be had for \$5 an hour. With each lesson I felt like I'd taken a stimulant, I was so hyped. It was like adrenaline had been pumped into every pore. But we left military life and I lost inexpensive flight opportunities.

Now five decades later, I had free time and I shared my life with Karl, a pilot of 40 years, who committed to instruct me. I jumped in. The flying part was more fulfilling and exhilarating than I had imagined. On the other hand, the extensive book learning part felt like prep to become an astronaut.

I started in Michigan. At first it was just to see how flight feels. I knew that part would go well. For years as a passenger on commercial flights, I'd hold my breath and then exhale, grinning at that moment on takeoff when a few hundred feet above the runway, I could feel the plane become one with the air. I knew I was different when I'd look around the cockpit and see that none of the other passengers appeared to be so thrilled by that moment of flight.

We found a flight school 90 minutes away. We'd get up with the sun, traveling from Karl's home at Lakes of the North, to Traverse City where I met Mark. He was about 25, thoroughly trained as an instructor. I was surely older than his grandmother, although he never left me feeling so. We walked together from the hangar to the two-seater Cessna 150,

a perfect beginner's trainer—simple instruments, effecting simple physical principles, or so he said.

The focus was total. I left the one-hour lessons exhausted and slept all the way home.

After a few months, Mark and I took my first cross country jog, from Traverse City north to Pellston, a 90-minute flight. We climbed to 3,500 ft. in a cloudless sky. It was fall, the trees below were blazing orange and gold, the air was crisp and clear. I could see all the way to the Mackinac Bridge connecting Michigan's upper and lower peninsulas, with the bluest of blue Lake Michigan to the left and Lake Huron to the right. I had become one with the universe, a tiny speck suddenly a part of the global landscape. I had found my place in space and time.

There must be few people at my age of 76 who are able to partake of an activity so consuming and thrilling. I was supremely lucky, I thought.

We'd begin with the pre-flight, an inspection of the airplane's every exterior part. If the plane malfunctioned in the air, there would be no shoulder on which to pull off the road. But I also learned that due to the aerodynamics of flight, with proper technique, a small plane can land in a field and the pilot can walk away.

I always sat in the pilot's seat; Mark sat at my side with access to the same instruments. At 3,000 ft. above the ground, he'd lean over, pull the throttle, thus cutting the fuel, and say with great seriousness, "You just lost your engine. What are you going to do now?"

Gulp. But wait. I'd already learned to constantly be on watch for an area open enough to land. No biggie. I'd select the level field I'd already noticed, set a glide path to reach it, then begin to troubleshoot why the motor died.

"Fly the plane," no matter what else, we students were told. It was exhilarating, a thousand times better than a Disney ride. But then came the hard part, when I had to learn what might make the carburetor ice-up, or the cylinders get too hot, or the compass

read wrong.

I had to hit the books. I enrolled in my first-ever online course. It was fully engaging and stretched my attention span from the obligatory 10 minutes between TV commercials, to the two-hour test segments at the end of every study unit. I cleared my calendar and did nothing else. I could feel my brain stretching.

I was required to take a two-hour FAA written exam given to every aspiring pilot. Some of it dealt with minutia; most of it required useful knowledge. I failed it the first time.

I'd already had over 100 hours of instruction, invested in countless gallons of fuel. I'd come too far to give up, I thought. If I could get that pilot's certificate, I'd have it forever.

So I dug in deeper, contracted with a different online program with more video material, and took another stab at it 3 months later. I passed but not with a wide margin to spare.

Then came the solo work. By now we were in Florida. I had listened to Karl and my instructor guide and direct and teach and lecture. I couldn't wait to take the wheel alone. But then I was ALONE. Yikes! I didn't go far that first time—just in a circle above the runway, staying in the pattern, doing a few "touch and goes," landing lightly and taking off again. But when I did my final landing, remembering every move I had learned, I felt I had grown 10-fold–like a balloon puffed to full expansion. The exhilaration matched childbirth, maybe. The sense of accomplishment was enormous.

My solos got longer, each one a story of its own. I got lost but found my way; I went the wrong direction once but discovered it soon; I landed going the wrong way on more than one runway. My flight to Sebring and back was significant: I miscalculated the time for the flight because I neglected to compute the wind factor. I was returning to an unlighted field. Darkness approached and the fuel needle edged toward empty. But the ever-present Gulf of Mexico helped me find my way. I discovered my field just as the sun slipped below the horizon, the entire sky, as far as I could see either way, was bathed in pink. I floated in for a perfect landing, I felt

like I had been suspended in heaven.

No wonder people fly, I thought. But if I was going to preserve the flying part, I had to master that dratted technical portion, concluding with the dreaded check ride. That's when a FAA examiner quizzes orally, then accompanies you into the plane to watch the performance of numerous required exercises. You have to complete the first part to get to the second.

I considered giving up. This is just too hard, I said. But after two months of solid study, morning to night, at 78 years old and with 170 hours of instruction, I gave it a try. I did not get over that first hump. I made errors on material I knew, confused numbers. I was humiliated, disappointed and depressed.

Thankfully, my pilot-partner-husband spoke little of my failure, giving me time to grieve and analyze. I did not fly for months. But little by little, I accompanied him, until the sting was mostly gone and I was able to take the wheel again.

We fly now, but I am not certified. My written test expires in six months. I do not wish to take it again.

Now I'm 79 years old. Did I gain enough new aviation knowledge to consider my brain stimulated so as to ward off oldness? How many more hours would be required for me to be pilot-proficient? Should I now just opt for a different new brain challenge, like learning Spanish, or Tai Chi?

Aviation is an expensive hobby. To take the FAA check ride is \$500, whether you pass or not. A 50-gallon tank of fuel costs about \$150 and is good for about four hours.

It's hard to put a dollar value on a new accomplishment for an 80-year-old. It can't be called a job skill. It might be considered supremely selfish to spend the time and the money on a "hobby" when at this age one might better assist others.

So, I vacillate. But I can certainly say my brain is better equipped to ponder the pros and cons than it was four years ago.




In 1965, a Frenchman,
Jacque Ellul, wrote an amazing
treatise "Propagandes"—plural
propagandas because his studies
convinced him that there is
a distinct difference between
agitation propaganda and
integrational propaganda with the
former leading citizenry from mere
resentment to rebellion, and the
latter aiming at making them adjust
themselves to desired patterns.

The two types rely on entirely different means and are practiced all over the world in different ways by different nations and societies. Integration propaganda is needed especially for the technological society to flourish, and its technological means—mass media among them—in turn make such integration propaganda possible. (From "Introduction to Propaganda" by Konrad Kellen, 1965)

Although Ellul's treatise was written 63 years ago, not much has changed, at least not in the democratic world. Agitation propaganda can work in time of war, civil unrest, or elections; integration propaganda can serve citizenry best in adapting to new political or economic policies, laws, and regulations of an orderly but transforming society. But not all integration propaganda is welcomed.

In our May 9th discussion of George Orwell's "1984" (Houghton-Mifflin-Harcourt 1949) members of Meadows Book Club will discuss Orwell's prize-winning novel and its relevance to today. Among the seminal texts of the 20th century, "1984" is a rare work that grows more haunting as its futuristic purgatory becomes more real. The book offers political



satirist George Orwell's nightmare vision of a totalitarian, bureaucratic world and one poor man's attempt to find individuality. The brilliance of the novel is Orwell's prescience of modern life—the ubiquity of television, the distortion of the language, and his ability to construct such a thorough version of hell. It is required reading for most students since it was published and ranks among the most terrifying novels ever written.

The New York Times book critic Michiko Kakutani wrote "Why "1984" Is a 2017 Must-Read" (Jan. 26, 2017) "The dystopia described in George Orwell's nearly 70-year-old novel "1984" suddenly feels all too familiar.

A world in which Big Brother (or maybe the National Security Agency) is always listening in, and high-tech devices can eavesdrop in people's homes. (Hey Alexa, what's up?) A world of endless war, where fear and hate are drummed up against foreigners, and movies show boatloads of refugees dying at sea. A world in which the government insists that reality is not "something objective, external, existing in its own right" – but rather, "whatever the Party holds to be truth is truth."

"1984" shot up to No. 1 on Amazon's bestseller list this week after an advisor to President Trump described demonstrable falsehoods told by the White House press secretary regarding the size of inaugural crowds—as "alternative facts." It was a phrase chillingly reminiscent, for many readers, of the Ministry of Truth's efforts in "1984" at "reality control." To Big Brother and the Party, Orwell wrote, "the very existence of external reality was tacitly denied by their philosophy. The heresy of heresies was common sense."

As literary political fiction and dystopian science fiction, "1984" is a classic novel in content, plot and style. Many of its terms and concepts, such as Big Brother, double think, thoughtcrime, Newspeak, Room 101, telescreen and memory hole have entered into common usage since its publication.

"1984" popularized the adjective Orwellian, which describes official deception, secret surveillance, brazenly misleading terminology, and manipulation of recorded history by a dictator or authoritarian state. In 2005, the novel was chosen by Time magazine as one of the 100 best English-language novels from 1923 to 2005. It was awarded a place on both lists of Modern Library 100 Best Novels, reaching number 13 on the editor's list, and six on the readers' list. In 2003, the novel was listed at number eight on the BBC's survey The Big Read.

"1984" was not the only prescient novel written in much earlier times: "Brave New World" by Aldous Huxley (HarperCollins Publishing, 1931), "It Can't Happen Here" by Sinclair Lewis (Signet Classics, 1970), and "The Handmaid's Tale" by Margaret Atwood (McClelland and Stewart, 1985) all told tales of speculative fiction (Margaret Atwood's description) of what could happen, using satire to project rising periods of social chaos and political power to create autocratic or theocratic societies.

Book club members were encouraged (but not required) to read the Huxley and Atwood books as further background for the discussion of "1984."







The front page story in the April 3, Sarasota Herald-Tribune told the fascinating history of World War II superheroes, including Chelmsford Close resident **Keith Cole**.






