

# Our Community of Plenty

■he Meadows is a unique community with plenty to offer. Little did Lord Frank Taylor, founder of The Meadows, know that over 40 years later, his community would still be highly sought after. Once a lone community virtually in the middle of nowhere, is now on the forefront of new homebuyers' mind. And the proof? This year alone, over 300 home sales have taken place. The Meadows is popular for a number of reasons but the reoccurring message is "the beautiful open space, abundance of large trees, vegetation and the convenient location."



The MCA does have beautiful vegetation, but that isn't all. We have infrastructure spanning over 1,650 acres that includes 85 ponds, trails, 14 miles of sidewalks, 22 miles of roadways, bulkheads, retaining structures, recreational areas, bridges, irrigation, fountains, waterfalls, signage, fencing, stormwater pipes, drainage inlets, outfall structures, headwalls, bollards, streetlights and more. All these components function as the backbone for The Meadows, which is the reason why it's critical that we maintain them properly.

All improvements play a role in keeping the community safe and vibrant. It is the daily work, repairs and preventative maintenance that makes The Meadows a formidable contender to surrounding communities and the reason why so many residents have lived here for so many years with many being second generational. Listed

below is a snap shot of items that receive attention throughout the year and often times go unnoticed but keeps our community in peak condition.

### Trees and Vegetation

The Meadows' native tree
Hammock includes Live
Oaks, Cabbage Palms and Pines.
The MCA performs oak tree
trimming bi-annually and palm
tree trimming annually. We have
recently completed our annual
removal of dead fronds of the 516
cabbage palms throughout our
common area.

Whether its vegetation added on land or in water, new plants are not only aesthetically pleasing but improve the environment – 2,000 aquatic plants have been added to our ponds and 150 to the community gardens. Thanks to our volunteer garden workers, our butterfly gardens, Memorial Garden and pocket gardens benefit from these individuals' green thumbs.

### **Sidewalks**

The MCA strives to keep our walkways safe. Maintenance personnel inspect our sidewalks and prioritize those areas that need attention. Broken panels or lifted edges are treated by either removing and replacing the panel or scarifying (grinding down) the edges. Scarifying creates a smooth transition from one panel to the next. Sidewalk repairs are on a continual repair/replace cycle.



### **Pressure Washing**

Now that we are moving into drier weather, we will perform even more pressure washing of our common area sidewalks concentrating on areas where dirt may have built up. Recently




completed common area walks:
Harvest Bend, Highlands
Bridge Rd., Amberly Drive,
Longmeadow/17th St., and walks
at the MCA. We encourage you to
look at your own house, driveway
and sidewalk to see if they could
use sprucing up.



### **Bridges and Bulk Heads**

Structural improvements have been made to Groves 13 bridge and Highlands 7 bulk head, both were at risk of failing. Keeping our assets and community safe is a priority.



### **Stormwater Drainage**

The MCA continually maintains our 85 waterbodies and drainage channels so that they are free of blockages and debris to ensure



our storm water system functions properly. Along with keeping swales cleaned out, excess dirt that erodes into culverts is removed annually. Recently the east side of Longmeadow drainage has been cleared with the west side soon to follow.

# Irrigation, Fountains and Pumps

Sometimes it is what you can't see that makes a difference. Whether it's irrigation pipes underground, heads, clocks or pumps, irrigation repair is ongoing; Taywater, Highlands Bridge,Ringwood Meadow,



Downham Meadow, 17th St entry. have all received repairs due to broken or clogged pipe and heads. Whether it is a small adjustment or an entire zone out, keeping the irrigation functioning properly keeps our landscape lush and healthy.

### Lights

The MCA maintains and owns over 120 common area lights (23 streetlights, 35 landscape lights, and 62 security lights). In addition, we work with FPL reporting any one of their 398 streetlights that may experience outage. Therefore, if you happen to see a streetlight is out, please report it to the MCA. A yellow ribbon around a streetlight pole means it has already been reported to FPL and is awaiting repair.

Aside from our normal infrastructure inspections performed by the MCA staff, the Long-Range Planning Committee has focused their attention on the importance of The Meadows infrastructure and will be developing a long-term strategy and vision to address the future needs of the community.



# THANKSGIVING IN THE MEADOWS

The benefits of living in a deed restricted community

he theme for November, "Our Community of Plenty" comes during a month containing a national holiday of Thanksgiving. This holiday gives us a chance to reflect on the many benefits that flow from living in a well-managed community like The Meadows.

As I drive around Sarasota I am always impressed by the appearance of The Meadows compared to any other community of similar age. It stands as a living tribute to the original framers of the documents of the community who had the vision to set in place standards that would enhance the quality of the community for years to come.

I thought it might be helpful to include in this article a reminder of the difference between maintenace work that does not require an application for Architectural Review and improvements that do require prior approval. Maintenance work such

as landscaping work in existing beds, roof repair, window repair, interior improvements and pool screening repair do not require prior approval.

Projects involving exterior painting, exterior lighting, roof replacement, doors, windows, gutters, driveway replacement, tree removal and planting, entire pool screening, fencing, generators, wells and landscape expansion require the submission of a request for Architectural Review prior to beginning the project. If you still have questions, you can access The Meadows Rules and Regulations on the MCA website or call the MCA office for clarification.

All of this sometimes sounds restrictive to new residents but the overall appearance of The Meadows probably entered into your decision to buy a property here. In addition, our standards have maintained property values which help protect what is

probably one of the largest investments we have. The housing market in The Meadows is red hot due to a combination of our location and the quality of life we all enjoy here.

One of the major contributors to our quality-of-life flows from the efforts of our many volunteers who serve on committees and help provide direction for our future. Without the efforts of dozens of volunteers, we would need a much larger staff to provide the same level of services we enjoy today. How much better it is to have residents who are willing to provide positive input through committee work rather than simply sit back and criticize without a willingness to serve the community in any positive way.

As always my thanks go out to the hard working members of the Standards Committee and to our staff who tirelessly give of themselves to make our lives better.

**The MCA** – The Meadows Community Association. This is the master association that governs The Meadows. The MCA oversees the management of all common spaces, a safety team, maintenance, and administration of the community's lifestyle programs and activities. The MCA's management and administrative offices are located at 2004 Longmeadow and its 9

member governing board is elected by the community.

Membership in the MCA is mandatory to all homeowners in The Meadows whether condo, villa and single family, and its annual assessment provides the managment and administration of 1,650 acres and over 20 buildings all roadways, ponds, lights and streets within the community. Within the MCA there is the management team hired by the community to manage The Meadows and the MCA board which is made up of volunteers from our community.

Please keep your eye out for our November mailing in order to start or renew your membership in the MHOA. Speaking for the single-family Homeowners as a group, gives us an important voice in the community.

# Plenty of Great Weather

Roy Wysnewski—The Meadows Weather/Hurricane Season Analysis: September Report

**S** eptember is the second consecutive month in which both temperature and rainfall were near normal – equating to plenty of great late-summer, early-fall weather for The Meadows.

The heat dome mentioned last month certainly has dissipated from earlier levels, yet the monthly high-temperature average remained above normal, albeit by only 1.2 degrees F. The significance of this is that our daytime hightemperature monthly averages have consistently been above normal in all but one month since January 2020! In that one month, December 2020, the temperature was normal – see Graph One. Area residents may find this graph interesting because it reinforces in real time the growing scientific evidence that points to our climate transitioning from subtropical to tropical – like that found in Miami, Florida! Details about this unique climate phenomenon can be found in a recently published paperback at Amazon.com – 'Climates in Crisis'. Other September temperature statistics reveal that maximum daytime temperatures exceeded normal on 19 days and there were two record-high-temperature days.

September concluded our fourmonth rainy season (June 1st to September 30th) with little fanfare as rainfall was just-short of normal, less than a half- inch. Likewise, the rainy season concluded in near-normal fashion with rainfall totaling 33.9 inches (normal is 34.5".) During a typical September, measurable rainfall is recorded on 13 days. Surprisingly, if one counts

the six days in which brief showers deposited 0.24" of water, a total of twenty-six rainy days were recorded this month! Truly amazing!

Monthly temperature and rainfall data are presented in Graph Two.

**Hurricane Season Analysis:** According to a WeatherTiger article appearing in the Sarasota Herald-Tribune (09/18/2021): "Since May 2020, forty-five tropical cyclones, twenty hurricanes, and ten major hurricanes have developed in the Atlantic. Twelve tropical storms, five Category 1 or 2 hurricanes, and three major hurricanes have made landfall in the continental United States." With all this tropical activity happening around us, residents in The Meadows have good reason to 'bask' in the historical good fortune of being spared impact by a major hurricane for the past sixty-one years --Hurricane Donna in 1960!

We may bask in our good fortune, but we must not 'fall asleep at the switch'. The risk for a major hurricane impact in Southwest Florida peaks in mid-October, specifically between the 13th and 27th, then


remains at a moderate level


until about November 10th. With

water temperatures continuing to run above normal in both the Caribbean Sea and the Gulf of Mexico, conditions are ripe for tropical cyclonic development in the western Caribbean.

Residents: Remain vigilant for the final third of this very active Atlantic hurricane season.

# Plenty of Password Hackers

### **Protect Yourself Against New ID Theft Schemes**

The problem: Creating strong passwords and remembering them is a heavy lift without some help, and many consumers fall into bad habits; in 2020, the most common password was "123456," according to password manager NordPass. If you reuse the same password on multiple accounts, a crook who grabs your log-in credentials for one website can use them to access other sites.

### How to protect yourself

"Good password management is one of the best risk-minimization steps people can take. I can't say that enough," says Velasquez. A password manager—such a Dashlane, Keeper or LastPass—is a great tool to securely store long-in credentials and to generate strong, unique passwords for each account. "Humangenerated passwords are normally very weak," says Fleming Shi, chief technology officer for security service

Barracuda. Some programs offer a free, basic version that manages passwords on a single device as well as advanced options that provide management on multiple devices and other features for a monthly fee. LastPass, for example, is free for one user with one device, \$3 monthly for one user with unlimited devices or \$4 monthly for up to six users with unlimited devices. Paid accounts come with extras such as one gigabyte of file storage, as well as monitoring of internet blackmarket sites for your personal information. Your web browser may offer password management, but dedicated programs are typically more powerful and provide more features. If you're creating a password without assistance from a program, choose a password with at least 12 characters, says Velasquez. Using both uppercase and lowercase letters is a good idea, too. You don't have to string together a nonsensical sequence of characters for the password to be secure. Instead, put together


a "passphrase" by combining a few words—say, from a favorite song or quote. You could choose a core passphrase and alter it for each account to ensure unique credentials for each site, says Velasquez.

Add a layer of security by using multifactor authentication whenever possible. A website, for example, may send you a code by text message or email when there's an attempt to log-in from an unfamiliar device and require you

to enter the code for access.

### What to do if you're a victim

If you find out that your log-in credentials have been compromised, immediately change your password on the effected account. If you use the same password on any other accounts, change those, too. (and choose unique passwords for each account this time.) At www. haveibeenpwned.com, you can look up your email address to see whether it and your passwords have been involved in any data breaches.

# Red, White and Blue Waves Proudly at The Meadows

he stars and stripes are a symbol of patriotism, bravery and history. Displaying the American flag is a great way to show our love for country. On Veterans Day we celebrate and honor all those who are serving or HAVE served the United States military. We give thanks for their service and the sacrifices they and their families have made.

Here are MCA flag rules and regulations and standard protocols to keep in mind.

### **MCA Basic Rules and** Regulations

Each owner of a flagpole shall be permitted to fly, in addition to an American flag, or by itself, one flag of national origin, state, non-profit agency, holidaythemed, professional or amateur sport, collegiate or American military organization. Any other flag not in one of the above categories may be approved through the Application for

Architectural Review process. All national origin, state and American military organization flags shall be flown in accordance with US Code Title 4 Chapter 1 – The Flag.

### **Standard Flag Protocols**

- Unlike Memorial Day, on Veterans Day it is not required to fly the flag at half staff.
- To retire a worn flag, start by folding the flag in a customary triangle manner. You may bring it to several flag retirement locations, such as a Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW) post, the American Legion, or a Scout organization. Check on-line for locations nearest you.
- Traditional guidelines call for displaying the flag in public only from sunrise to sunset; however, the flag may be displayed at all times if it's illuminated during darkness and is an all-weather flag.

- The flag should never touch anything beneath it, such as the ground, the floor, or water.
- All persons present in uniform (military, police, fire etc.) should render the military salute. Members of the armed forces and veterans who are present but not in uniform may render the military salute.
- All other persons should face the flag and stand at attention with their right hand over the heart, or if applicable, remove their headdress with their right hand and hold it at the left shoulder, the hand being placed over the heart.





# Just in Time For Fall Pumpkin Pie Crisp

Heading into the holiday season, probably one of the most popular aromas is "Pumpkin Spice," the smell that inundates so many homes during the extended holiday season. The flavor and the aroma are in almost everything you eat or drink. In your coffee or cupcake, it combines the wonderful blends of allspice, cinnamon, cloves, ginger, mace, and nutmeg, which gives us that "homey" smell of the holidays this time of year.

### **Pumpkin Filling**

- 1 (15-oz.) canned pumpkin purée
- 1 cup granulated sugar
- 3 large eggs
- 2 teaspoons pumpkin pie spice
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 2 teaspoons vanilla extract
- 2/3 cup heavy cream



### **Streusel Crumb Topping**

- 2 cups all-purpose flour
- 1 1/2 cups granulated sugar
- 2 teaspoons cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 12 tablespoons unsalted butter, melted

### **INSTRUCTIONS**

### **For Pie Filling**

- Preheat oven to 375°F. Butter a medium casserole dish.
- In a large bowl, stir together pumpkin, sugar, eggs, pumpkin

pie spice, salt, and vanilla extract. Whisk in heavy cream until smooth.

### **For Streusel Crumb Topping**

- In a medium bowl, whisk together flour, sugar, cinnamon, and salt. Add melted butter and stir with a fork until crumbly.
- Spread cinnamon streusel topping on top of pumpkin pie mixture in an even layer
- Bake until the filling is set and golden brown, 40 to 45 minutes

Top with vanilla ice cream and enjoy!

# Let's Go To the Hop

reedom. I got my first real taste of it at 12 with a Christmas present from my very cool, Corvette-driving cousin. Trust him to know my heart's desire --a blue portable record player, a far cry from the console model encased in mahogany in the living room. Now I could choose my own music and listen far from the prying eyes and ears of my mother, as I tried to dance. I still remember the first record I bought --"The Great Pretender" by The Platters.

Most of us remember discovering our music and our dances. In the 50s and early 60s it was a defining moment for a generation. Join Michael Bruno for a trip back to the days when we were 10 and just beginning to discover the communal experience of the dance floor.



Let's Go To the Hop

Madison. The Stroll. The Hully Gully. Chicago Rock and Roll. The Shag. The Mashed Potato. The Monkey. The Swim. The Slop. The Locomotion. The Watusi. The Twist. The Alligator. The Jerk. One after another the dances flooded out of our AM radios in mid-1950s America, nudged by our hero DJs. Season by season, then month by month, and then it seemed every week brought a new dance. It was brilliant marketing to our Baby Boomer urge to be In-With-The-In-Crowd cool; and the seemingly endless torrent of driving back-beat music that fed the urge changed the "in" dance much faster than Detroit changed car models. The music drove a culture that we dug and our parents - sometimes vehementlydid not. Neat-o! Cool! The Philly Sound. The California Sound. Sun Records and the Memphis Sound. Biggest of all for dancing, The

Motown Sound from the assembly line Hitsville USA at 2648 West Grand Boulevard in the Motor City. Churning out tunes to a dancing 4/4 with a backbeat that could not be resisted. Rebellion in our feet.

Before the precipitous changes, though, I had a peek into what would be my new culture. Ten years old, I went to the last Sock Hop in my hometown.

Though my pal Billy and I didn't know our label, we were approaching the tween years, exploring the older kids' world, and we wanted to know what it was all about. We might have learned of the hop from Billy's older sisters who'd chase us out of the first floor when they had friends over to dance to the likes of Johnny Mathis and Pat Boone on their hi-fi. Likely too, it might have come from Barney, older brother of our friend Dave. Barney would tolerate us in the "club"

house" the two had cleaned and painted behind their grandmother's house. It was there he one

day said "you ought to hear this guy" and put on a 45 rpm record with a new guy named Elvis. Even before we ever saw him, it was only natural to gyrate like crazy. Billy's sisters and Barney were sock hop age, not we. But we'd been bitten, we wanted to know what the big kids did with this music, and so we went.

The Hop was in the huge B.P.O.E hall added to the back of a grand old mansion downtown. It was a lot like the school gym-multipurpose rooms then, but with grander, less utilitarian details. Glazed blond brick walls shoulder high, with tall, draped windows above them on both sides, at one end a raised curtained stage, a half-acre of yellow

pine floor polished enough to reflect the ceiling lights. The center of business was at the entry end. Edged by tables and on a more forgiving floor was the main reason for the club's existence, beyond formal brotherhood of course: a curved wooden bar at which World War II was still actively lived G.I. style, with some Yanks and Doughboys chiming in to make comparisons to their war. A scent of beer and


whiskey lingered permanently in that area. We knew that smell from passing the wide-open bars along Water Street.

Billy and I made our way through these groups and came up short at the edge of the floor. Wall to wall, there were the Big Kids! A sea of them churning and swinging! Dancing!

"That's as far as you go, boys," one of the adults commanded us. "The shoes stay here." And of course under his stern supervision and with assurances that our black Keds would be right where we left them, we complied. Like for everyone else, it was white socks from there.

A familiar DJ voice from the local AM station directed the floor with his mic and a vinyl stack of hits. The tunes came so fast there had to be two turntables in play: Philly Doowop, Rockabilly, Dwayne Eddie, Roy Orbison, The Big Bopper, Elvis, Connie Francis, Bill Haley and The Comets, The Everly Brothers, Jerry Lee Lewis, Johnny Cash, Brenda Lee, Fabian, Frankie Avalon, Paul Anka, The Four Seasons, Eddie Cochran, Patti Page, Dion, Ricky Nelson, all the chart toppers from that week's Billboard.

With the Elks being "Brotherly and Protective" It was too soon in downtown Chillicothe Ohio for brown Ritchie Valens. It was too soon for Bo Diddley, Chuck Berry, Fats Domino. It was too soon for The Platters, The Orioles, The Moonglows, The Del-Vikings, Frankie Lymon and The Teenagers, The Larks. It was certainly too soon for the likes of Little Richard. It was too soon for any non-white, performer or dancer.




Look down, look at your feet, look up, look at the crowd. This was a white sock hop.

Our idols, the Big Kids, stayed in constant motion: dancing crazy, swinging each other, bouncing, holding hands, finger-popping, kicking and twirling. Close in, then away, behind the back, under raised arms, then face to face again. Frenetic, kinetic, and in uniform only with the beat of each tune. It was what the Lindy had morphed into as generic "Rock'n'Roll." It was not the frantic life-affirming jittery intensity of the 1940s Lindy, answering the equal intensity of war.

This sock hop dancing was loose, each couple performing proudly what they chose to do, including their own steps worked out in home rec rooms. Poodle skirts swirling, collared shirts tucked in but some sleeves rolled to hold a pack of smokes, ponytails bouncing on the girls, and D.A.s, sideburns and a tanker truck of Brylcreem on the guys. A few beatnik pedal pushers, some tight black jeans, any black tops trimmed with pink or white. Angorawrapped class rings being flashed. Boppers, cats, kittens, and greasers. All on the beat, all swinging out. All lost in a collective euphoria.

Billy and I didn't see anyone we could tag onto, so we did our own crazy versions of what we thought we saw being done. Individual improvs. The stuff older siblings go ape over. A sprinkling of others our age was easy to pick out doing the same, except we'd all stop and wipe away the perspiration when the DJ announced a slow dance or a ladies' choice. The slow dances became more frequent, cooling the mood and the dancers. One last slow dance and it was over. Time for the teens to get on with their day. It was noon on a Saturday in my home town.

# The Island of Sea Women

Joanne Simons — November Book Preview

■he Meadows Book Club will be discussing The Island of Sea Women (Scribner; 2019) by Lisa See at its meeting on November 10th. This story is about the lives of two women, Young-soon and Mi-ja, who live on Jeju Island off the southern coast of Korea.

The young women are free divers, part of a collective of women divers known as haenyeo who, simply by holding their breath, dive to depths of up to 30 meters to collect the sea creatures that they will sell to make a living. The particulars of their enormous skill and fortitude in diving – with no additional oxygen or wet suits, in sometimes frigid waters – is fascinating. But their lives are not lived only in the sea. Koreans suffered under Japan's brutal control from 1910 to 1945. The story of Young-soon and Mi-ja begins in 1938. They survive not only the Japanese occupation but also World War II and the Korean War, all with crushing consequences.

"See did extensive research with primary sources to detail not only the haenyeo traditions, but the mass murders on Jeju beginning in 1948, which were covered up for decades by the South Korean government."

"The novel's narrative is exceptionally well-wrought with complex themes of loss and forgiveness, culminating in the collection of visceral emotion in the face of impossible situations. There is no need for fancy mechanics or flowery language in See's writing. Simple and personal prose allows readers to see themselves in Youngsook's straw shoes, feeling every ounce of pain and exhilaration as she does. We feel her ambition, her relief, her love, and her hatred. Like Young-sook, each character is deeply flawed and given room to grow throughout the novel, persuading audiences to imagine them as the real people upon which the novel is based."


Lisa See was born in Paris, France,

in 1955, and grew up in Los Angeles. She is a graduate of Loyola Marymount University.

After 13 years writing for Publishers Weekly, and as a freelance writer, she wrote the nonfiction On Gold Mountain: The One Hundred Year Odyssey of My Chinese-American Family (1995), for which she also wrote a libretto for the Los Angeles Opera.

Being one eighth Chinese (through her paternal great-grandfather) has had extraordinary influence on her many novels based on Chinese characters and culture. Those novels include The Flower Net (1997), The Interior (1999), Dragon Bones (2003), Shanghai Girls (2009), Dreams of Joy (2011), Snow Flower and the Secret Fan (2005), Peony in Love (2007), China Dolls (2012), and The Tea Girl of Hummingbird Lane (2017).

We started a new cycle in August. Between sessions, members write on suggested or personal topics, then e-mail their poems to the coordinator for a PowerPoint. browser when you click on it.

New participants are always welcome! The two overarching goals are to have fun and to create one's own takeaway poem.
